Grayshott C of E Primary School School Uniform Policy

Rationale:

At Grayshott Primary School we believe that school uniform gives a sense of pride and identity and ensures all pupils share a common identity and that no-one feels outside the school family regardless of their background.

Policy:

All children are expected to wear school uniform. The range of clothing which children should wear is practical and comfortable. A variety of tops with logos is available from the PTA and orders forms are available from outside the school office. Payment is required on ordering both to be left in the PTA post box. All items of clothing should be marked with the child's name.

Uniform:

Grey knee length skirt or pinafore dress
Grey knee length shorts or trousers
Grey or white shirt
School polo-shirt or white polo shirt
Maroon cardigan, jumper or school sweatshirt
Red check or gingham dress or skirt for summer
Grey or white socks or tights

Footwear:

Sensible, low heeled black shoes
No open toed sandals or slip on shoes for safety reasons
Year R children will need a named pair of wellington boots to keep at school.
Trainers should not be worn except for games lessons and at break.

Hair:

Hair longer than shoulder length should be tied up at all times.
Extreme hairstyles are incompatible with the standard expected at school.

P.E. and Sports Clothing:

For reasons of comfort and hygiene all pupils need a change of clothing and footwear for P.E. All clothing should be named.

Black plimsolls or trainers
White, black or maroon shorts
Tracksuit for outside in colder weather
White T-shirt
White or grey socks
Bag for Sports kit (no ruck sacks)

Swimming kit:

Swimming trunks or costumes
Towel
Swimming cap
Goggles (recommended)
Bag for swimming kit (no ruck sacks)

Jewellery:

Jewellery should not be worn at school. The only exception is if children have pierced ears then they may wear ear studs. These have to be removed for P.E. Serious accidents have occurred at schools to some pupils who now have impaired hearing caused through the 'stud' puncturing the mastoid process behind the ear. Parents should teach their child to remove and replace their own ear studs or ensure ear studs are not worn to school on those days when a child has P.E. If this is not possible then the ear stud needs to be covered with tape which the child provides for P.E and swimming.

Watches maybe worn, but taken off for P.E. Nail vanish should not be worn in school.

Lost Property:

All clothing and property should be clearly labelled. Lost property is kept in a marked box at the entrance to the Victorian building and in the school hall. Any unclaimed, unnamed items are passed to the PTA for sale or charity.

Bags:

As storage space is limited the only bags in school should be

- ~ A school book bag for reading book, home school books, homework and letters.
- ~ A named lunch box.
- ~ A named PE bag.
- ~ A named swimming bag for swimming days only.
