



The pupil premium is a grant given to schools to close the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers, and to support pupils with parents in the armed forces. Schools receive £1,320 for each pupil who is, or has been, eligible for Free School Meals and £300 for children with parents in the armed forces.

1:1 and small group interventions to ensure that children make progress in literacy and numeracy. These include Sidney (literacy intervention), SALT (Speech and Language Therapy), Alpha to Omega and phonics sessions. New interventions for 2016-17 included First Class @ Number, Code X Reading and precision teaching.	£7,300	6 Pupil Premium children benefited from 1:1 or small group interventions in phonics, maths and reading. First class @ number – on average 6.5 months progress over 10 weeks. Precision teaching - on average pupils achieve 90% of targets in an 8 week block. Code X – children make accelerated progress on book bands.
Rising Stars assessments to improve assessment and feedback in Reading and Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling, enabling teachers to focus their teaching on specific skills.	£1,500	Children were more confident in approaching the tests. 75% children increased their score in the GPS tests.
Whole school spelling programme to improve outcomes in writing.	£220	This was introduced in the summer term. Spelling sessions are now taking place regularly throughout the school.
PSA – Parent Support Advisor supported families to improve attendance and promote parental support and engagement in learning.	£1,800	PSA worked with one family who trigger Pupil Premium (2 children). This led to greater parental involvement in the children's learning,

		increased motivation and self-esteem for the children and improved attendance and punctuality.
ELSA support for vulnerable children to minimise the impact of emotional barriers to learning.	£3,500	ELSA support was provided for 3 Pupil Premium children, dealing with issues including anger management and self-esteem.
Financial support for school visits to ensure that PP children could attend.	£200	One pupil premium child did not attend a school residential but this was due to parental choice. All pupil premium children attended day visits linked to the curriculum. As a result they were fully integrated into the class and benefited from follow-up learning opportunities.
